Cross-Cutting Approach

- ▶ Hospitals serve as partners, conveners, and backbone organizations.
- ▶ Aligning investments through Community Health Needs Assessments (CHNAs), Community Health Improvement Plans (CHIPs), and regional health collaboratives.



Upstream Prevention

- ▶ Community education and wellness events delivered with regional partners.
- ▶ Youth, caregiver, and family engagement focused on prevention and early intervention, including prevention campaigns reaching caregivers and families at scale.
- ▶ Food access initiatives support chronic disease prevention.

Impact Investing

Impact Investing, or place-based investing, is the strategy of using a portion of an organization's investment assets (or capital) to fund projects and businesses within the communities they serve.

Unlike grants, impact investments function as loans with the goal of improving community health and well-being while earning a financial return.

Investment initiatives align with local and regional community health needs and may include affordable housing, BIPOC and women-owned business growth, childcare facilities, healthy food access, renewable energy, job creation and more!

Alice Hyde Medical Center

Alice Hyde Medical Center collaborated with the Adirondack Rural Health Network of the Adirondack Health Institute (AHI-ARHN), Franklin County Public Health and key regional partners to implement the 2025-2027 Community Health Needs Assessment and Community Health Improvement Plan in alignment with the New York State Prevention Agenda. Top priorities AHMC will address for the next three-year cycle are: **Preventive Services for Chronic Disease Prevention and Control, Mental Well Being and Substance Misuse.**

- ▶ Partnership with Hudson Headwaters Health Network continues, increasing access to primary care for several hundred new patients this year. New primary care health center on the AHMC campus will expand access in 2026 to mental, behavioral, and primary care for nearly 10,000 residents in the AHMC service area.
- ▶ Joined 134 regional multi-sector stakeholders at the UHF (United Hospital Fund) Regional Convening. Continue to engage in collaborative planning and regional prioritization to address gaps across physical, behavioral, and social care needs.
- ▶ AHMC piloted successful Pediatric/Youth Health Fair in partnership with the Malone Central School District and 20 community agencies. 25 AHMC staff members donated 200 hours to conduct.

Central Vermont Medical Center

In 2025, CVMC, in partnership with THRIVE ACH, led coordinated efforts to advance the priority areas identified in the 2022–2025 CHIP: **Chronic Disease Prevention, Mental Health, Substance Use, and Social Drivers of Health.**

As the backbone organization for THRIVE, CVMC supported several notable achievements.

- ▶ THRIVE was recognized by the Vermont Public Health Association for its leadership during the 2024 Central Vermont Flood Response.
- ▶ THRIVE presented at the UVM Health Equity Summit, highlighting the collaborative’s work in rural health, community response, and climate impacts on social needs.



With 2025 marking a CHNA cycle year, CVMC, in partnership with THRIVE, also completed a new CHNA and CHIP to establish strategic direction and collaborative efforts for the coming three years.

CVMC welcomed CVPC into the organization to build on their long history of collaboratively addressing substance use.

- ▶ 21 community engagement and/or outreach events in CY25, reaching 677 people.
- ▶ 35,112 caregiver-age adults reached by FUTURES VT Talk. They Hear You. campaign.
- ▶ 4,500 community members served through Resources and Options for Alcohol Drinking (ROAD) program. 17% of patients who screen positive for AUD in CVMC Primary Care offices received evidence-based, best-practice medications to treat AUD, compared to 2% nationally.
- ▶ ~150 Harm Reduction Packs distributed across the hospital.
- ▶ 85 community members trained in Narcan use.

Champlain Valley Physicians Hospital

In 2025, CVPH and the Clinton County Health Department collaborated closely with community partners to develop the 2025–2027 Community Health Needs Assessment for Clinton County. The top priority areas identified in this assessment include:

- ▶ Economic Stability (Housing Stability and Affordability, Poverty, Nutrition Security)
- ▶ Social and Community Context (Primary Prevention, Substance Misuse Prevention, and Overdose Prevention)
- ▶ Health Care Access and Quality (Preventive Services)

Survey feedback indicated that housing security emerged as the leading priority, marking a significant shift from previous years.

Elizabethtown Community Hospital

In 2025, ECH strengthened its community presence through free wellness events and clinician investments and partnered with the Essex County Health Department to complete the 2025–2027 CHNA/CHIP identifying these top priorities:

- ▶ Economic Stability (Poverty; Unemployment; Nutrition Security)
- ▶ Social and Community Context (Depression; Overdose Prevention; Tobacco/E-Cigarette Use; Healthy Eating)
- ▶ Neighborhood and Built Environment (Access to Community Services and Supports)
- ▶ Health Care Access and Quality (Preventative Services for Chronic Disease Prevention & Control)

Porter Medical Center

In 2025, PMC increased efforts to advance the health priorities of **access to health care, housing, and mental health and substance use care** through collaborations with community partners, including increasing engagement via CHAT, Addison County's Accountable Community for Health.

- ▶ 20% improved patient capacity at Middlebury and Vergennes Primary Care Clinics.
- ▶ PMC engaged in events and trainings supporting the LGBTQIA+ community, including proudly walking in the Middlebury Pride Parade.
- ▶ Hosted several community events on PMC grounds for partners, including:
 - ▶ Addison Independent Maple Run
 - ▶ Turning Point Center of Addison County: Hope in Motion 5k and Wellness Fair

University of Vermont Medical Center

In 2025, UVM Medical Center and the Chittenden Accountable Community for Health Teams continued to address health priorities of cultural humility and inclusive health care, housing and mental health and wellbeing. UVM Medical Center additionally worked with partners to complete the CHNA, identifying the following priorities for three years: **Building Community Connectedness, Engaging on Mental Health and Increasing Health Care Access.**

- ▶ Rolled out the Hair Equity Project to all UVM Health hospitals, focused on training staff in how to care for a wider variety of hair types and stocking appropriate products. Over 85 staff were trained.
- ▶ Provided funding to VAAP (Vermont Asylum Assistance Program) to deliver training to more than 50 shelter, social service, and housing providers, focused on improving service delivery for immigrant communities and offering an overview of the local immigrant services landscape to enhance referral pathways.
- ▶ In partnership with the City of Burlington and Champlain Housing Trust (Harbor Place), provided \$14,500 of emergency funding to help families at imminent risk of homelessness maintain stable housing and access essential support.
